## **A SEASON OF REORIENTATION**

<sup>20</sup> Very truly I tell you, you will weep and mourn while the world rejoices. You will grieve, but your grief will turn to joy. <sup>21</sup> A woman giving birth to a child has pain because her time has come; but when her baby is born she forgets the anguish because of her joy that a child is born into the world. <sup>22</sup> So with you: Now is your time of grief, but I will see you again and you will rejoice, and no one will take away your joy.

John 16:20-22

- I. The Psalms are the international prayer book of Israel and the Church.
  - A. The Psalter, the 150 Psalms are given to mentor us in our relationship to God over the full range of human experience throughout all the seasons of life.
  - B. The Psalms offer us a rich, diverse, and varied language of faith.
- II. A mature language of faith embraces the three categories of the Psalms.

A. Psalms of Orientation. (Psalm 145)

<sup>1</sup> A psalm of praise. Of David. I will exalt you, my God the King; I will praise your name for ever and ever. <sup>2</sup> Every day I will praise you and extol your name for ever and ever. <sup>3</sup> Great is the LORD and most worthy of praise; his greatness no one can fathom. <sup>4</sup> One generation commends your works to another; they tell of your mighty acts. <sup>5</sup> They speak of the glorious splendor of your majesty-- and I will meditate on your

wonderful works. <sup>6</sup> They tell of the power of your awesome works-- and I will proclaim your great deeds. <sup>7</sup> They celebrate your abundant goodness and joyfully sing of your righteousness.<sup>8</sup> The LORD is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and rich in love.<sup>9</sup> The LORD is good to all; he has compassion on all he has made. <sup>10</sup> All your works praise you, LORD; your faithful people extol you. <sup>11</sup> They tell of the glory of your kingdom and speak of your might, <sup>12</sup> so that all people may know of your mighty acts and the glorious splendor of your kingdom.<sup>13</sup> Your kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and your dominion endures through all generations. The LORD is trustworthy in all he promises and faithful in all he does. <sup>14</sup> The LORD upholds all who fall and lifts up all who are bowed down. <sup>15</sup> The eyes of all look to you, and you give them their food at the proper time. <sup>16</sup> You open your hand and satisfy the desires of every living thing. <sup>17</sup> The LORD is righteous in all his ways and faithful in all he does. <sup>18</sup> The LORD is near to all who call on him, to all who call on him in truth.<sup>19</sup> He fulfills the desires of those who fear him; he hears their cry and saves them. <sup>20</sup> The LORD watches over all who love him, but all the wicked he will destroy. <sup>21</sup> My mouth will speak in praise of the LORD. Let every creature praise his holy name for ever and ever.

B. Psalms of Disorientation. (Psalm 88)

<sup>1</sup> A song. A psalm of the Sons of Korah. For the director of music. According to mahalath leannoth. A maskil of Heman the Ezrahite. LORD, you are the God who saves me; day and night I cry out to you. <sup>2</sup> May my prayer come before you; turn your ear to my cry. <sup>3</sup> I am overwhelmed with troubles and my life

draws near to death. <sup>4</sup> I am counted among those who go down to the pit; I am like one without strength. <sup>5</sup> I am set apart with the dead, like the slain who lie in the grave, whom you remember no more, who are cut off from your care. <sup>6</sup> You have put me in the lowest pit, in the darkest depths. <sup>7</sup> Your wrath lies heavily on me; you have overwhelmed me with all your waves. <sup>8</sup> You have taken from me my closest friends and have made me repulsive to them. I am confined and cannot escape; <sup>9</sup> my eyes are dim with grief. I call to you, LORD, every day; I spread out my hands to you.<sup>10</sup> Do you show your wonders to the dead? Do their spirits rise up and praise you? <sup>11</sup> Is your love declared in the grave, your faithfulness in Destruction? <sup>12</sup> Are your wonders known in the place of darkness, or your righteous deeds in the land of oblivion?<sup>13</sup> But I cry to you for help, LORD; in the morning my prayer comes before you. <sup>14</sup> Why, LORD, do you reject me and hide your face from me? <sup>15</sup> From my youth I have suffered and been close to death; I have borne your terrors and am in despair. <sup>16</sup> Your wrath has swept over me; your terrors have destroyed me. <sup>17</sup> All day long they surround me like a flood; they have completely engulfed me.<sup>18</sup> You have taken from me friend and neighbor-- darkness is my closest friend.

C. Psalms of Reorientation. (Psalm 73)

<sup>1</sup> A psalm of Asaph. Surely God is good to Israel, to those who are pure in heart. <sup>2</sup> But as for me, my feet had almost slipped; I had nearly lost my foothold. <sup>3</sup> For I envied the arrogant when I saw the prosperity of the wicked. <sup>4</sup> They have no struggles; their bodies are healthy and strong. <sup>5</sup> They are free from common human burdens; they are not plagued by human ills. <sup>6</sup>

Therefore pride is their necklace; they clothe themselves with violence. <sup>7</sup> From their callous hearts comes iniquity; their evil imaginations have no limits.<sup>8</sup> They scoff, and speak with malice; with arrogance they threaten oppression. <sup>9</sup> Their mouths lay claim to heaven, and their tongues take possession of the earth. <sup>10</sup> Therefore their people turn to them and drink up waters in abundance.<sup>11</sup> They say, "How would God know? Does the Most High know anything?" <sup>12</sup> This is what the wicked are like-- always free of care, they go on amassing wealth. <sup>13</sup> Surely in vain I have kept my heart pure and have washed my hands in innocence. <sup>14</sup> All day long I have been afflicted, and every morning brings new punishments. <sup>15</sup> If I had spoken out like that, I would have betrayed your children. <sup>16</sup> When I tried to understand all this, it troubled me deeply 17till I entered the sanctuary of God; then I understood their final destiny. <sup>18</sup> Surely you place them on slippery ground; you cast them down to ruin. <sup>19</sup> How suddenly are they destroyed, completely swept away by terrors! <sup>20</sup> They are like a dream when one awakes; when you arise, Lord, you will despise them as fantasies.<sup>21</sup> When my heart was grieved and my spirit embittered, <sup>22</sup> I was senseless and ignorant; I was a brute beast before you.<sup>23</sup> Yet I am always with you; you hold me by my right hand.<sup>24</sup> You guide me with your counsel, and afterward you will take me into glory. <sup>25</sup> Whom have I in heaven but you? And earth has nothing I desire besides you. <sup>26</sup> My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever.<sup>27</sup> Those who are far from you will perish; you destroy all who are unfaithful to you. <sup>28</sup> But as for me, it is good to be near God. I have made the Sovereign LORD my refuge; I will tell of all your deeds.

- III. Psalms of Orientation (Psalm 145)
  - \* The world makes sense
  - \* God is present.
  - \* All is as it should be.
  - \* Life is predictable and reliable.
  - \* Good is good; evil is evil.
  - \* Right is right; wrong is wrong.
  - \* Nothing is amiss.
  - \* God blesses the righteous and punishes the wicked.
  - \* The universe is running the way God intended it to.
  - \* The implication is that if you believe the right things and behave in right way you will always be blessed like this.
  - \* There is an absence of tension of any kind.
  - \* Nothing is gray; all is perfect clarity.

The resulting response -worship!

- IV. Psalms of disorientation/Language for the "excluded middle" (Psalm 88)
  - \* Nothing makes sense.
  - \* Nothing is as it should be.
  - \* God is absent; heaven is silent.
  - \* Evil is rewarded; good is punished.
  - \* Reality comes unhinged.
  - \* All is grey.
  - \* No answers are given.

- \* Chaos and confusion reign.
- \* There is an absolute tension without resolution, which leads to anger, rage, lament, and grief.

The resulting response is Hopelessness.

- V. Psalms of Reorientation (Psalm73)
  - \* The past is embraced and learned from. But can never be returned to again.
  - \* God's fulfillments are always greater than his promises. Therefore, he leads us in a brand-new way which we could never have conceived.
  - \* We wind up facing God alone as our unchanging reward.
- IV. All three in one Psalm
  - A. Psalm 73:1 Orientation
  - B. Psalm 73:12-14 Disorientation
  - C. Psalm 73:15-17 Reorientation
  - D. Psalm 73:18-26 Resolution comes.

Repentance and rest are realized.

Reality is radically re-conceived.

No answers are given and nothing changes but the Psalmist.

God goes from being the provider to being the blessing provided.

## Conclusion

Real Life in God embraces all three categories: orientation, disorientation, and reorientation. We must have a language, a spiritual syntax of meaning, a grammar wide enough and deep enough to embrace all the realities involved in a walk with God.
