- II. Fruit while you wait in quarantine (Jeremiah 29:10)
 - ¹⁰ This is what the LORD says: "When seventy years are completed for Babylon, I will come to you and fulfill my good promise to bring you back to this place."
 - A. The virus of idolatry was removed.
 - B. God established his presence among the Babylonians. (The leaven of pre-evangelism. Daniel 1-6)
 - C. God raised up Daniel to influence the world.
 - D. Nebuchadnezzar, the king of the world, becomes a believer. (Daniel 4:34-37)
 - E. The Jews lived in peace in Babylon. (The O.T. canon was formed.)
 - F. Judaism becomes a worldwide religion.
 - G. The synagogue and yeshivas prepared six centuries in advance.
 - H. Daniel and company introduce biblical prophecy to the learned. 550 years later, the magi will arrive. (Daniel 5:11; Mathew 2:2)
- III. Three principles while wandering
 - A. The test of expediency. Does this act, belief, or choice help or hinder me and those I'm leading?
 - B. The test of enslavement. Does this act, behavior, or choice bring me into bondage, or free me and those I lead?
